ACI Programs

ACI raises scholarship funds from corporations, foundations and individuals for deserving first-generation, minority and low-income students attending member colleges and universities, to underwrite tuition and related expenses. In fiscal 2015, there were more than 325 scholarships awarded.

ACI's Emergency Financial Aid Program provides funds to meet the financial needs of students facing unanticipated hardship which can disrupt their academic studies during the school year. Emergency financial aid enables students from low-to-moderate income families the opportunity to continue their studies without interruption, even if they suffer reversals of fortune once they are enrolled at an ACI institution.



of Bachelor of Arts degrees last year were awarded to firstgeneration students. (President of ACI-affiliated college) The Peer Mentoring Program increases the number of first-generation, minority and low-income college students who remain in school, succeed and graduate from ACI member colleges and universities. The program matches at-risk college freshmen with peer mentors – trained juniors or seniors – from similar backgrounds.

The retention rate for students participating in the Peer Mentoring Program is as high as 97 percent. Beginning in fall 2016, Peer Mentoring programs will operate on seven member campuses, serving 150 students.
