



Richard Ekman has been president of the Council of Independent Colleges since 2000. During his tenure CIC has grown in membership, added many programs and services, and increased participation in CIC's major programs.

He previously served as vice president for programs of Atlantic Philanthropies and, from 1991 to 1999, as secretary and senior program officer of the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation. From 1982 until 1991, he was at the National Endowment for the Humanities, successively as director of the Division of Education Programs and the Division of Research Programs. His previous experience includes service as vice president and dean of Hiram College, where he was also a tenured member of the history faculty; and assistant to the provost at the University of Massachusetts at Boston.

He currently serves as a member of many boards, including those that provide guidance to the Yale-New Haven Teachers Institute, Harvard University's Library and Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, American Academic Leadership Institute, American Council on Education, the Hollings Center for International Dialogue, and the Dictionary of American Regional English. He has been awarded honorary degrees by Alvernia, Otterbein, and Marywood Universities, and Alderson-Broadbuddus, Bethany, Georgetown, Hastings, and Ursinus Colleges, and is a recipient of the W.E.B DuBois Medal of Harvard University. He is co-author, with Richard E. Quandt, of *Technology and Scholarly Communication* (University of California Press, 1999). His essays have appeared in *The Chronicle of Higher Education*, *University Business*, *Inside Higher Ed*, and *The Washington Post*.
