"I didn't know if I wanted to run or not in college, but then I saw it would be an opportunity for scholarship, so I went for it, and now I'm running here at Judson," she says. "The sport has given me a lot of opportunities and a lot of chances to do things that I wouldn't have done without the sport, so I'm very grateful for it."



Her father has helped her pay for tuition, but earlier this year, he was unable to work. Rodriguez reached out to Judson for financial help. The university offered her a lifeline by awarding her an ACI General Scholarship, which helped her remain in school.

Presidents of Two ACI Member Colleges and Universities to Attend Education Technology Conference



ACI and the [Council of Independent Colleges \(CIC\)](#) are sponsoring presidents of two ACI-member colleges and universities to attend a significant education technology conference, "[ASU + GSV Summit](#)," April 17-19 in San Diego.

[President Troy D. VanAken](#), left, of Elmhurst University and [President Jamel Santa Cruze Wright](#), right, of Eureka College will attend the conference, said April Arnold, ACI executive director.

The summit is a collaboration of Arizona State University (ASU) and Global Silicon Valley (GSV). Initiated in 2010, "the summit connects leading minds focused on transforming society and business around learning and work," according to the event website. Last year, more

than 5,200 people attended from 55 countries, including more than 600 leaders in higher education.

"In the past, independent colleges have largely been absent from this event, and I am delighted that Presidents VanAken and Wright will represent ACI as a part of the CIC's exploratory delegation this year," Arnold said. "The conference programming provides a rich proposition for all attendees. I look forward to having them share highlights of what they learn later this spring."

CIC decided to sponsor a delegation to attend to increase independent college participation, said Sherita C. Ashmon, CIC director of state councils and networks support. CIC expects to send about 50 leaders of independent colleges to the event, she said.

Blackburn College Appoints Permanent President, McKendree University Extends President's Contract



Two ACI-member institutions announced made significant announcements about their presidents this month.

The [Blackburn College](#) Board of Trustees appointed Dr. Gregory J. Meyer as the school's 19th president, college reported in a [news release](#). Meyer, a former Blackburn professor and administrator, succeeded Dr. Mark Biermann, who recently resigned after two-and-a-half years at Blackburn to focus on health, well-being and extended family.

"Blackburn has played a profound role throughout my life and has become a significant part of my adult identity, professionally and personally," Meyer said. "I am humbled and honored by the privilege of accepting the board of trustees' appointment to serve as the next president of this remarkable institution."

During more than 30 years at Blackburn, Meyer has held a variety of academic and administrative roles, including department and division chair, professor of philosophy and religion, dean of students, college counselor and director of church relations. Although he retired in 2014, he remained actively engaged with the college, returning in 2020 as interim provost and again in 2022 as interim president.

Meyer earned a bachelor's degree from Carroll College (now Carroll University) and holds a Master of Divinity and Doctor of Ministry from Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary. After seminary, he served as pastor of Presbyterian churches in Wisconsin until his arrival at Blackburn in 1981.

McKendree University extends president's contract

The [McKendree University](#) Board of Trustees announced a multi-year contract extension to President Daniel C. Dobbins through June 30, 2026, according to a university [news release](#).

Dobbins is McKendree University’s 33rd president and is a 1981 graduate of the institution. He is married to Mickey (Macaluso) Dobbins, also a 1981 graduate. He became president on Jan. 1, 2020.

"It continues to be one of Mickey’s and my greatest honors to serve McKendree University in this capacity," said Dobbins. "While we couldn’t be prouder of what we have accomplished, we have much more to achieve together as One McKendree."

Under Dobbins’ direction, McKendree University has accomplished much, including developing and launching the UNITED strategic plan, launching the Clear Path admissions strategy, attaining a successful Higher Learning Commission Year 4 Accreditation assurance review, providing a major transformation to Holman Library’s space with a learning and technology center, and more.



A. Montgomery Ward Foundation Renews and Increases ACI Scholarship Grant

A [foundation](#) that has provided scholarship grants to ACI for more than 50 years has awarded a new \$60,000 grant to ACI to be used for scholarships for moderate-income students. The grant, provided by the A. Montgomery Ward Foundation, Bank of America, N.A., Co-Trustee, is an increase of \$8,000 from a grant awarded ACI the previous year, said Lauren Holhut, ACI director, foundation relations and grants.

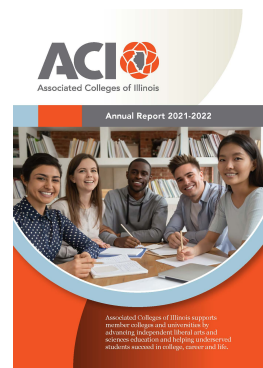

"In 2022, the average affordability gap for students at four-year colleges was about \$2,600. Even a financial aid gap of \$500 can have a negative impact on a student's ability to remain in college," Holhut said. "We are grateful for the generous increase in scholarship dollars that ensures more promising students will be able to stay on track for graduation and earn the critical, life-changing undergraduate degree."

The grant period is for one year beginning in January 2023 and supports the A. Montgomery Ward Foundation Scholarship Fund.

Named for Aaron Montgomery Ward, a well-known Chicago entrepreneur, the foundation was established in 1959 by his daughter, Marjorie Montgomery Ward Baker. It supports and strengthens "charitable institutions that provide quality educational and cultural programming" for current and future residents of Chicago, and surrounding communities, according to the foundation's description.

The Looming Demographic Cliff: Proactive Strategies and Legal Considerations to Address This and Other Challenges in Higher Education

The impending "demographic cliff" is not news to anyone working in or around higher education. The sharp decline in high school graduates that is expected to decrease enrollment numbers significantly is only a few years away.

However, census data and high school graduation enrollment numbers show the demographic cliff may be more pronounced in Illinois than in other states. In Illinois, the number of high school



graduates reached its peak in 2014-15 and is projected to decline by up to around 25% by mid-2030. Based on the data and its anticipated impact in Illinois, Illinois higher education institutions ("HEIs") must ensure they have a plan in place to lessen the impact of the demographic cliff on their bottom line.
