"The ACI General Scholarship has made such a difference for me. I don't have to work quite as many hours. I don't receive funding from other sources. This has helped relieve financial stress so much."

ACI Scholar Erin Fleshren plans to attend law school and is thinking about a career focused on personal injury or medical malpractice. At <u>McKendree University</u>, Fleshren is a speech communication major, with minors in political science and leadership, which support her interest in law, she says. She plans to complete her college education in three years, with graduation in spring 2018.

Fleshren is learning about her career interests at the Belleville, Illinois, law firm of Mathis, Marifian & Richter, LTD, where she is a file clerk. "Working there has given me some insight to the different types of law because they have a transactional side and they also have a litigation side," Fleshren says. "I find both to be extremely interesting. Right now, I'm leaning toward the

litigation aspect."

Fleshren, from Belleville, always knew she would attend McKendree. Her grandfather, Woody Derickson, served many years on McKendree's Board of Trustees, and an uncle also attended the school. Fleshren has stepped into several leadership positions at the university, including roles as vice president of the student government association, vice president of the National Honor Society of Leadership, new student orientation leader and peer mentor for first-year students. Her favorite leadership role is that of president of her sorority, Tri Sigma (Sigma Sigma Sigma). She has also worked in the campus activities office.

A new role this year is chair of the Student Advisory Committee of the Illinois Board of Higher Education (IBHE), which she previously attended as McKendree's student representative. She work with two student voting representatives to the board and regularly attends IBHE meetings as an observer.

Stacie Gill Augustana College ACI Peer Mentor

Senior Stacie Gill says it's a "great experience" to be a mentor in ACI's Peer Mentoring Program at Augustana College. "I've had the opportunity to meet new students. You can share so much about your story, and reassure students that 'I was in the same position as you' and also create friendships within this program," she says.

Gill, the youngest of four children, majors in psychology and sociology. She chose <u>Augustana College</u> because it's a small liberal arts college where professors know their students. Plus, she has access to many resources, career opportunities and it's just over two hours from her Chicago home. Gill's mother works with students with disabilities in the Chicago Public School system. Her father is a substance abuse counselor in a hospital and a sister has a psychology background. Those influences,



along with her own interests in mental health and social justice, have led Gill to consider a career as a counselor, perhaps in a school setting.

Gill benefited from have a mentor when she came to Augustana and says that's probably why she is involved in the ACI Peer Mentoring Program now. "It sparked an interest in me to be a mentor in this program," she says. Gill has been a leader in organizations such as the Black Student Union, Latinx Unidos, Psi Chi, the national honor society for psychology, and she has worked in the Office of Multicultural Student Life. She has worked on campus diversity initiatives and served on the President's Student Advisory Council. Gill made the dean's list multiple times and earned scholarships and an endowment that paid for a summer internship through the Psychology Department.

Gill checks in regularly with students she mentors. There are also group peer mentoring workshop activities such as creating online profiles, self-care in college, time management and balancing college activities with academics.

Peer mentoring allows students to develop their identities and learn about their passions, which is why the program is a good investment, Gill says. "People who invest in this program are investing in so many students who are looking for an awesome experience and future," she adds.

ACI Career and Internship Fair Set for March 23, 2018, at North Central College CIC and Shure Family Charitable Trust provide key funding

ACI will hold its first-ever Career and Internship Fair Friday, March 23, 2018, at North Central College, in Naperville. The event is supported by a Council of Independent Colleges (CIC) National Venture Fund Challenge Grant of \$21,750, matched by a generous gift from the Shure Family Charitable Trust.

Nearly 250 students representing ACI's 24 member-colleges are expected to attend the full-day event, with programming scheduled from 8:30 a.m. until 4:15 p.m. The schedule includes an employer expo, where students can present credentials to employers, skill-building workshops to help students prepare for career paths, and opportunities for students and employers to interact informally, including a sit-down lunch and a networking lounge.

Career services professionals at ACI colleges and universities have been asked to host groups of students to ACI's Career and Internship Fair, and ACI will offer modest transportation grants to help cover travel costs, especially for schools from outside the Chicago metro area.

ACI is reaching out to corporations and large not-for-profits to participate in the March 23 fair as partner employers or sponsors, and a range of investment opportunities and benefits are available to match employers' specific needs. "ACI's Career and Internship Fair offers employers the chance to meet the critical thinkers and problem-solvers who will drive our future economy," said ACI Executive Director Mick Weltman. "The students studying right now at ACI's liberal arts-based colleges and universities are the promising prospects employers need to reach today's goals and achieve success in the years to come."

Liberal Arts Colleges and Universities Produce Quality Employees, Says Morningstar CEO

The chief executive officer of <u>Morningstar</u>, an investment research firm, said his firm wants to hire candidates who are "emotionally aware, self-aware, empathetic and gritty" – qualities graduates of liberal arts colleges and universities often bring to the workplace.



Kunal Kapoor, who became Morningstar's CEO this year, earned a bachelor's degree in economics and environmental policy from ACI member <u>Monmouth College</u>, a private liberal arts college in Monmouth. He later earned an MBA from the University of Chicago Booth School of Business.

"We've found the best hires at Morningstar are the folks who've done really well at smaller liberal arts colleges versus folks coming out of big universities," said Kapoor. He said that in his senior year at Monmouth, he reluctantly took an art history class his academic adviser

recommended. "I ended up loving it," he said, because it helped him see the world from others' viewpoints.

"If you want diversity, and if you want a balance of men and women in the workplace, liberal arts colleges are usually a very good place to be looking," he said. "I would encourage you to always think about the fact that the people that you aspire to work with and have as clients are often the ones who have a diversity of ideas and diversity of knowledge."

Dr. Clarence R. Wyatt, Monmouth College president, introduced Kapoor. He told the audience that Illinois liberal arts colleges and universities tend to have many first-generation college students. The "transformative power" of the liberal arts experience touched his own life, he said, pointing out that he was a first-generation high school student and college student; his parents' formal education ended with eighth grade. "Our family didn't have many financial resources. It was the philanthropy of others who made this path possible for me," he said.

"Every day, the independent liberal arts colleges and universities of Illinois make miracles happen. They enable young people to see and seize opportunities they would never have dreamed of, much less realized, without this experience," Wyatt added.

Kapoor and Wyatt addressed a Dec. 6 meeting of 35 Chicago-area wealth advisers and guests, sponsored by ACI. Its purpose was to introduce ACI to the financial advisers as a possible investment for their clients. Morningstar is represented on the <u>ACI Board of Trustees</u>.



important life lesson that helped Coughlin in her current role was learning how "pivot" toward something else after her experience with theatre, she added.
