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ACI Colleges and Universities Diverse, Offer Wide Range of Academic Programs

Students attending the <u>26 member colleges and universities</u> of Associated Colleges of Illinois (ACI) are learning in diverse environments and are afforded opportunities to learn that emphasize small classes, real-world project learning and a variety of internships, according to ACI research. ACI members are also producing teachers and health-care workers in larger numbers than the state's largest universities.



These findings come from a recent compilation of <u>demographic statistics</u> from ACI member schools (see image, left). Among the nearly 50,000 total undergraduate students:

- + about 58 percent are women
- + about one third are students who are American Indian, Alaskan or Native Hawaiian, Asian, Black/African American, Latinx or multiracial
- + more than one third are eligible for Pell Grants, awarded to students with the greatest financial need
- + more than 800 students are attending ACI colleges and universities with GI Bill benefits

"These findings confirm what we already knew: Students who attend private, liberal arts colleges in Illinois are learning important skills and life lessons that lead to productive careers in the state's economy," said Mick Weltman, ACI executive director. "Also, ACI-affiliated schools have diverse student bodies, which contribute to a rich and wideranging learning environment. This is vital in today's global economy."

ACI members, all private, independent institutions, have student bodies with characteristics similar to Illinois' public colleges and universities. 2018 statistics compiled by the Illinois Board of Higher Education for Illinois (IBHE) public colleges and universities show ACI schools have a slightly higher percentage of students who are women (58 percent to 51 percent). The IBHE statistics also show a slightly greater percentage of students of color or multiracial students attending Illinois public colleges and universities (37 percent to 33 percent).



ACI members supply greater numbers of nurses and teachers

At most of ACI's colleges and universities, top academic programs are business, education, health professions and basic sciences. ACI-compiled statistics from 2017 show that ACI member institutions are graduating nurses and teachers at a nearly 2-to-1 rate when compared to Illinois' largest public and private colleges and universities.

ACI alumni working throughout the Illinois economy

<u>Illinois employment</u> for alumni of ACI colleges and universities is strong, with more than 23,000 employees working for 148 top Illinois employers with at least 25 ACI alumni, according to ACI research figures. The top five Illinois employers of alumni of ACI-affiliated institutions are Advocate Aurora Health, Blue Cross/Blue Shield, State Farm, JPMorgan Chase & Co. and Caterpillar.

Attendees are encouraged to be prompt, as sessions will be locked 10 minutes after they begin. All boot camp sessions will be recorded and will be made available to ACI member institutions.



Colleges and universities with students on campus are encouraged to arrange for students to view the boot camp as a group, if they can safely convene a group. Open to all students enrolled at ACI member institutions, ACI's Boot Camps are designed specifically for low-income, first-generation and students of color. The sessions seek to deliver skills, information and networking resources that advance career development for

students who may not have family members who have earned college degrees or pursued careers that require degrees. The program was launched in 2019-20, with support from a Council of Independent Colleges First Opportunity Partners Grant.

Michael Traversa is working in jobs he had hoped for after graduating from college. Now a strength and conditioning coach at Benedictine University and Morton College in the Chicago area, Traversa says he's grateful for opportunities to work in his chosen field so soon after college. "That was the goal, "he says. "I just didn't think I'd be so lucky that fast."

Traversa explains that he and his four siblings were raised by their maternal grandparents. They made it possible for them to attend Catholic primary and secondary schools. After graduating from high school, Traversa started college at a Chicago-area university, but says he didn't do well academically. He left and took two years off from school before starting at Benedictine University in Lisle, Illinois, in 2015.

"The reason I wanted to go to Benedictine was growing up in Chicago, there were a lot of distractions," Traversa says. Benedictine was a good choice, he says, because it offered a new experience and it was close to Chicago and his family. He was also attracted by Benedictine's

exercise science and football programs. Traversa played on Benedictine's football team for two years, most recently as a lineman and tight end. During his senior year in 2019, Traversa was presented the Tom Wirtz Award for Courage and Integrity, one of Benedictine's top awards for student athletes.

ACI Initiates Partnership with SAGE Scholars to Help Families with Tuition Costs

ACI is now working with <u>SAGE Scholars</u>, an organization that helps bridge the gap between students who want an affordable, private college education with colleges that will guarantee tuition discounts. To participate, there's no cost to the student, family or college, says Mick Weltman, ACI executive director.

"We think SAGE Scholars has the potential to help many students who want to attend <u>ACI's member colleges and universities</u>," Weltman says. "We are working directly with our members to encourage as many as possible to join SAGE Scholars, because this program can definitely help in their academic recruiting efforts."

Founded in 1995, Philadelphia-based SAGE Scholars is a unique, private college savings program. Member families earn "<u>Tuition Rewards Points</u>" by investing in preferred providers of dental, health and vision insurance, life insurance,

retirement plans, college funding plans, fraternal organization memberships and other financial incentives. One Tuition Rewards Point equals \$1 in guaranteed scholarship funds at a SAGE Scholars member college or university. Tuition Rewards can be used to pay for up to one year's tuition at a SAGE Scholars member institution, says A.J. Healy, director of corporate marketing, SAGE Scholars.

"SAGE Scholars, and our Tuition Rewards program, are integral in helping families prepare for higher education at all stages of a child's life," Healy says. A key incentive for member colleges and universities to join is that they earn access SAGE Scholars' database of students, he explained.

More than 400 private colleges and universities across the country, including 16 ACI members, are in the SAGE Scholars College Consortium. Healy says. About 90 percent of member institutions have earned U.S. News and World Report's "America's Best" ranking, he added.

ACI Launches Fall Term Career Mentoring Program for College Seniors

ACI's Career Mentoring Program launched this fall with 28 business mentors matched with at least 17 students from 10 member colleges and universities, according to Aaron Adams, partner, HR strategy and alignment, Mentoring Complete. The new program matches business mentors with college seniors to help the students prepare for careers after their college experience.

ACI's Career Mentoring Program is a partnership with Mentoring Complete, a St. Louisbased firm with considerable experience in successful business and corporate mentoring programs. Among its clients are Enterprise Holdings, New York Power Authority, OhioHealth and Reach International.



The Career Mentoring Program is part of ACI's College-to-Career initiative. It also includes Work and Life Skills Boot Camps, ACI's Career Development Conference and Career Expo; micro-internships through Parker Dewey; and ACI's job-postings webpage.



The Career Mentoring Program is designed so that students and their mentors have consistent interactions to help students translate what they've learned in the classroom to the workplace. Mentors sometimes help the students find future careers.

ACI Awarded Matching Grant for 'Career Leaders Program' Launching in 2021

CIC funds to be awarded when ACI achieves 2:1 match

The Council of Independent Colleges (CIC) Washington, D.C. has committed \$18,000 to help fund ACI's Career Leaders Program, expected to launch in fall 2021. The program is "a collaborative program designed to provide



underserved, high-achieving college seniors with a year of comprehensive training and support in developing business, social, and leadership skills," according to ACI's grant application. Students will use those skills to secure entry-level positions leading to meaningful careers, the application said.

In addition to training and support, each participant in the ACI Career Leaders Program will be awarded a \$2,000 scholarship to help fill financial gaps on the way to graduation.

ACI's proposal was funded through a First Opportunity Partners grant from CIC, with support from the UPS Foundation. CIC's financial commitment is contingent upon ACI raising an additional \$36,000 by spring 2021.

"The Career Leaders Program is a logical next step that integrates ACI's <u>College-to-Career</u> initiatives into one program for the benefit of students enrolled at ACI's colleges and universities," said Mick Weltman, ACI executive director. These initiatives include ACI's Skills for Work, Skills for Life Boot Camps, ACI's Career Development Conference and Expo and the ACI Career Mentoring Program, which launched this fall. A fourth initiative, paid micro-internships through ACI's partner, Parker Dewey, completes the Career Leaders Program, he said.

Each of the career initiatives has achieved excellent attendance rates, Weltman said. More than 60 students have attended boot camps, nearly 300 participants attended career development conferences, 34 students have obtained paid work experiences through micro-internships, and about 20 senior executives and civic leaders are mentors to students this fall.

Each ACI member institution will select one underserved, high-achieving senior to participate in the Career Leaders Program. Chloe Overstreet, ACI student board member from Eureka College, will serve as the program advisor and student liaison.

Dominican University President Donna Carroll Announces Retirement After Nearly 30 Years



After almost three decades of visionary leadership, <u>Dominican University</u> President Donna M. Carroll has announced her retirement, effective June 2021, according to a university news release. The university is conducting a presidential search.

Appointed as Dominican's first lay president in 1994, Carroll was one of the youngest -- and one of few women -- college presidents in the country. She currently is one of the longest-serving university presidents in the state of Illinois.

Three years after her appointment, she guided the university through a successful name change -- from Rosary College to Dominican University, recognizing the institution's growth while honoring its founding Dominican Order.

Carroll has led the university during a period of extraordinary and sustained growth. During her tenure, the number of full-time faculty has doubled, new schools and programs have been established and the university's operating budget has increased four-

fold. She has managed three campaigns that raised more than \$165 million in support for student aid, programs and facilities, including five endowed chairs, three new buildings, and countless scholarships in addition to significant federal grant support. It was during Carroll's tenure that the university purchased a second campus and, most recently, dedicated a new Learning Commons, an area encompassing integrated student services, study space and the WeatherTech Innovation Lab.

Before joining Principia, Williams worked in the Civil Rights Division of the United States Department of Justice and as an attorney in private practice. He earned a juris doctor degree from The George Washington University and is a 1976 graduate of Principia College.
