On any given day in Illinois, thousands of students are working hard to earn their degrees and prepare for meaningful careers. At the heart of Associated Colleges of Illinois (ACI) is a simple truth: we bring together philanthropic and career partnerships to help make their path a little easier.

ACI exists to amplify the vital work of our member colleges and universities—each one distinct, each one deeply committed to student success. Many of these students are the first in their families to attend college or come from economically challenged backgrounds. While each has its own story, they are united by a shared belief in the power of education and the promise it holds for the future.

We began by listening. Through our spring member assessment and state council benchmarking, we gained valuable insight into evolving campus needs. We also welcomed new leadership at several member institutions, infusing ACI with renewed energy and fresh perspective.

To take this learning further, we convened a Strategic Working Group of corporate trustees and college presidents. Their task: to help chart a future defined by deeper alignment, thoughtful innovation, and broader impact. One message was clear—members and corporate partners alike want more ways to connect, collaborate, and build solutions together. We're aiming to answer that call.

We piloted a new student development initiative with Prolific Institute, supporting 20 students from four institutions. We explored new partnerships, including with BravenX. And, we made deliberate choices to do less, *better*, and to focus on what matters the most to serve students and the institutions that educate them.

Looking ahead, the strength of ACI continues to depend on all of us—our member schools and their leaders, corporate trustees, generous donors, partners, and our dedicated staff. Together, we are capable of so much more.

I'm proud to share that ACI closed fiscal year 2024 with a financial surplus, a meaningful achievement and a reflection of the disciplined, value-driven work behind the scenes. We renewed lapsed support, reimagined our annual benefit as a breakfast forum, and saw the profound impact of legacy giving from the late Don Campbell and the enduring generosity of former board chair Peter Willmott, who also passed away in late 2023. They will continue to change students' lives through their endowed scholarship support. Their legacies remind us just how much of a lasting difference one person can make.

Advancing Inclusion and Impact

On April 11, 2024, ACI hosted its inaugural Breakfast Forum: Harnessing the Power of Inclusion at Saul Ewing's Chicago offices, bringing together regional leaders to discuss diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) in education, workplaces, and boardrooms.

A special highlight of the event was hearing the inspiring story of ACI member student Alexis Martinez who spoke of persistence & purpose. Alexis, a socialwork and criminal justice double major, is driven by a passion for uplifting others. Her journey—shaped by diverse experiences in Chicago, studying abroad, fuels her dream of owning a juvenile detention center that empowers young people to reach their goals.

Despite financial struggles, Alexis persevered. "This scholarship helped me stay in school... My hard work was going to pay off." Her story is a testament to resilience, education, and the power of believing in one's potential.

Setting the stage for the event was a distinguished panel featuring Shannon Fuller (Health Care Service Corporation), Tyronne Stoudemire (Hyatt Corporation), and Liz Gross (Campus Sonar)—moderated by Toby Eveland (Saul Ewing)—that explored DEIstrategies, the economic benefits of inclusion, and the evolving expectations of today's workforce.

Keynote speaker Marquis Miller, Vice President of Economic Development at the Obama Foundation, provided an insightful discussion that connected inclusion to real-world outcomes in both education and economic development. As Miller stated, "Diversity, equity and inclusion, and belonging are not abstract topics; they are important lenses that when applied to economic development can help improve conditions for all people and businesses and make our economies stronger, more resilient, and more innovative." Miller emphasized that inclusive strategies are not only morally imperative but also economically vital, urging attendees to take action in their own spheres of influence.

- Expanding and strengthening the talent pipeline
- · Bridging generational gaps in the workplace
- · Creating psychological safety and promoting wellness
- · Cultivating resilience and perseverance
- Harnessing the power of language and storytelling to drive impact.

With support from corporate sponsors and ACI Trustees, the Forum raised nearly \$65,000, plus an additional \$12,741 in donations, to support ACI programs.



COLLEGE TO CAREER

ACI's College-to-Career Programs reflect an emphasis on supporting students preparing to transition to careers and matching employers with talent emerging from ACI member colleges and universities. This effort addresses preparing students for future employment by building critical life skills, identifying career opportunities, networking with employers, and securing rewarding first-time jobs.


Associated Colleges of Illinois continually seeks to address critical challenges that independent higher education can help solve through collaborations among its member colleges and universities, businesses, nonprofit partners, and public and private funders. ACI programs address two key national priorities:

- 1. Improve the outcomes of higher education by raising graduation rates among low-income and first-generation students;
- 2. Reduce college debt by improving the efficiency and effectiveness of higher education and by providing financial aid that makes independent higher education affordable to an increasingly diverse student population.

Peer Mentoring Program

ACI's Peer Mentoring Program supports first-generation and low-to-moderate income freshmen at ACI member institutions by matching them with trained and supervised Peer Mentors who share similar high school backgrounds. These mentors, recruited from sophomores, juniors, and seniors who have overcome similar challenges, help at-risk students navigate their critical first year of college. By addressing financial and educational inequities, as well as the lack of family experience with higher education, the program promotes college persistence and degree completion among the students it serves.

By establishing a "relationship bridge" between mentees, mentors, the campus community, and its support services, ACI's Peer Mentoring Program acts as an early warning system. This aproach helps to identify and address the specific challenges faced by these students before they can negatively impact a student's college experience. With input from the mentor coordinators and students, ACI has developed a mentoring guide app that will roll out in the next academic year to support its members.



During the academic year 2023-24, the Peer Mentoring Program supported a total of 144 students, comprising 120 mentees and 24 mentors at 11 ACI-member institutions situated in urban, suburban, and rural areas across Illinois.

ACI PROLIFIC Fellowship Pilot:

Bridging Love of Sports with Careers

To enhance the support ACI offers to students at member schools, we recognized a key opportunity: a significant portion of our student body is made up of athletes.

The transition out of collegiate sports can be a difficult and often disorienting experience. For many student-athletes, it marks a major shift in daily routine, identity, and social structure. This period of change can lead to mental health challenges, including depression, anxiety, and a loss of purpose. Additionally, the rigorous demands of athletic programs often leave little time for athletes to explore career options or build new skills, leaving them underprepared for the job market.

To address these challenges and help student-athletes navigate life after college, ACI partnered with the PROLIFIC Institute to launch a one-year pilot program focused on career readiness and personal development. Funded by Fiducient Advisors with \$29,000 in seed support, the initiative served 10 senior athletes from six ACI member schools, providing professional development, mentorship, and career guidance designed to support their transition into fulfilling post-college careers.

Through this partnership, ACI member schools will have the opportunity to provide a variety of resources and support for their student-athletes within one year of graduating. The program supports student-athletes through coaching, emotional and professional development, and community learning, while also providing access to opportunity upon graduation.



Through the ACI Prolific Fellowship, students gained access to invaluable resources and support throughout the process. Participants, like Hadam Dicko of Knox College, gained industry connections, soft skills, and career confidence, leading to internships and job opportunities.

Fellow Ayobami Arokoyo used his skills to advance to the final interviews for a prestigious internship with Becton Dickinson, a global leader in medical technologies and devices. Ayo shared, "To be honest, without their generous assistance and influence, I would not be here."

ACI Executive Director April Arnold and PROLIFIC's Nosa Eguae emphasized the program's impact, powered by Fiducient Advisors and the generosity of Robert and Terri DiMeo.

ACI is proud to support students as they take meaningful steps toward their careers, bridging the gap between education and workforce readiness.

ACI Micro-InternshipWebinar with Parker Dewey

ACI continues to promote Micro-Internships to member schools and corporate partners. These short-term, paid projects connect motivated students and recent grads with professional opportunities. On November 15, we hosted a 30-minute webinar to explain how Micro-Internships work and the types of projects students can complete.

Representatives from Parker Dewey shared how these opportunities create equitable access to careers while helping businesses tackle important tasks.

These short-term, paid, professional assignments through ACI's partner, Parker Dewey, take place throughout the year and involve five to 40 hours of work. Students gain opportunities to demonstrate skills, explore career paths and build networks.

Employers connect to a skilled and diverse talent pool, improve the effectiveness of hiring efforts, and lower the costs associated with integrating new employees into their organizations.

Attendees learned how Micro-Internships provide on-demand project support and a valuable way to engage with students. The session included a live demo and walkthrough of the program's benefits. This event showcased a scalable way to support both organizations and the next generation professionals at 11 ACI-member institutions situated in urban, suburban, and rural areas across Illinois.

Online Offerings

As a statewide organization, we are leaning into the development of online forums to engage in discussions about workforce needs and career development, providing insight into industry expectations and emerging opportunities.

These conversations not only equip students and school staff with practical knowledge but also foster valuable relationships with employers who are eager to invest in the next generation of talent and the leaders who help guide students on campuses. At the same time, corporate partners benefit from early engagement with a diverse pool of motivated students who can become future employees, interns or industry leaders.

By building these connections, we aim to bridge the gap between education and career success, creating a mutually beneficial network that supports students, schools and employers.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND EMERGENCY FINANCIAL AID

Investing in scholarships and emergency financial aid for the Associated Colleges of Illinois is a crucial strategy for advancing ACI's mission to improve college graduation rates. ACI institutions already have higher-than-average graduation rates among low-to-moderate income and first-generation students. Generous financial aid significantly contributes to this success.

In 2023-2024, ACI awarded scholarships to member schools, assisting 218 students with a total of \$387,210. This funding came from corporations, foundations, and individual donors, with an average of \$1,749 in scholarship funding per student.

McGraw Foundation **Student Emergency Assistance Fund**

ACI scholarships and funds from the McGraw Foundation Student Emergency Assistance Fund are available to member colleges and universities throughout the academic year. Financial aid officers at these member institutions are responsible for administering the scholarships and emergency assistance funds to eligible students.

ACI meets the financial needs of students facing unanticipated hardships that can disrupt their academic studies. This aid enables students from low to moderateincome families the opportunity to continue their studies without interruption.

Several students received crucial support, including McGraw Scholarship recipient, Michael Ford. He has distinguished himself both academically and through campus involvement. A dedicated member of McKendree University's co-ed cheer squad, Michael balances athletic teamwork with scholarly excellence.

For three consecutive vears, he has been featured in the university's Academic Excellence Celebration, most recently presenting his capstone project on

academic discipline andleadership potential. In the 2023-2024 academic year, ACI provided

\$100,000 in McGraw Foundation Student Emergency Assistance, benefiting 60 students. The average assistance received per student was \$1,667. Since its inception in 1990, ACI's Scholarship Program has distributed over \$7 million in need-based scholarships.

Financial information is presented for ACI's fiscal year ending May 31, 2024. ERAG Eiffel, Rambo Advisory Group Certified Public Accountants, issued ACI an unmodified opinion on the financial statements.

As of May 31, total assets were \$1,421,439, while liabilities were \$371,358. Total Net Assets were \$1,050,081. Gifts, awards, and other services totaling \$562,324 were distributed to members during the year.





Honoring the Legacy of Two Visionary Leaders: *Remembering Donald Campbell and Peter Willmott*

In Fall 2023, ACI mourned the passing of two remarkable leaders and former trustees, **Donald A. Campbell** and **Peter S. Willmott**. Both men dedicated their lives to expanding educational opportunity and left an enduring legacy across ACI's network of colleges and universities.



Don Campbell, a visionary in the fundraising field and founder of Campbell & Company, helped generate more than \$3 billion in philanthropic support during his career. He retired from active management of the firm in 2006 but remained deeply committed to the profession and to advancing educational access. His dedication to first-generation students continues through the **Donald A. Campbell Endowed Scholarship Fund**, supported by the Campbell Family Foundation.

Peter Willmott, a respected business and civic leader who served as ACI Board Chair, believed deeply in the power of education to transform lives. Together with his wife, Michele, he established a substantial endowment for ACI that created scholarships awarded annually through ACI member colleges and universities. These awards support students with financial need who also demonstrate outstanding leadership on campus. Through the **Michelle and Peter Willmott Fund for Minority Student Leadership**, his generosity continues to open doors for students across Illinois.
